

In December of 2023 the board approved a patronage capital retirement/refund of \$1,417,743 to the members, bringing the total funds refunded to the members to \$28,741,257.



LREC wrapped up fiscal year 2023 (FY 2023) maintaining a healthy financial position. We had 12.78% higher energy sales as compared to 2022 and 6.65% higher than projections. Additional Sales did not generate adequate revenues to cover all the operating expenses of the cooperative. 
